



District 214 Education Foundation Scholarship Application

IMPORTANT MESSAGE TO APPLICANTS

All D214 seniors are eligible to complete this application in order to be considered for one or more scholarships funded and overseen by the District 214 Education Foundation. These scholarships range in value from one-time \$500 awards to higher renewable allocations.

Scholarships available in Spring 2017 include:

- **Brett Robert Jostes Girls in STEM Scholarship (\$500)**: Awarded to one District 214 female senior annually who is pursuing a career in science, technology, engineering or mathematics
- **Redefining Ready! Scholarship (up to \$2,500)**: Awarded to five District 214 seniors (one \$2,500 award, one \$1,000 award, three \$500 awards) who demonstrate, through a 30-second Twitter video and brief essay on how they are college and career ready beyond a test score. The attached supplement and Twitter-hosted video is required to apply for this scholarship.

By completing this application, you are applying to all scholarships for which you are eligible, based on their criteria. **You must complete this application only once, even if you are applying for multiple District 214 Education Foundation scholarships. You may be required to answer specific supplemental questions based on the scholarship for which you are applying.**

Prepare your application carefully, listing academic achievements, activities, leadership roles, volunteer service, employment and financial need. Do not be discouraged if there are sections you can not complete. Each scholarship considers different traits and you may be the perfect candidate for one of these scholarships.
