Principal's Message...

Dear Parents,

I find it almost impossible to believe that the 2010-11 school year has come to an end. Now that graduation has taken place and finals are over, we need to take time to reflect upon the year just ended and celebrate all of our accomplishments. And what a year it was!

We graduated 472 students, or approximately 98% of the senior class. According to national data, the average percent of students graduating from high school is 69%. We are so proud of our students and staff for this achievement, as documented by the tremendous success of the senior class. During the graduation ceremony, almost 30% of the students wore a rope or sash, indicating graduation with honors. Three days before graduation, we held our annual scholarship breakfast to honor those seniors who received a financial award to college. The 189 students received \$1.9 million in scholarships. That will certainly go a long way in defraying costs during the freshman year. Congratulations!



A final word about our graduates – they were a really special class. They showed tremendous leadership in the school, were outstanding athletes, artists and actors, and performed service to the school and community. Their contributions have influenced John Hersey High School, and they will be missed.

On another note, we have received our ACT scores, the high stakes test taken by all juniors. The results are spectacular. You should have received your student's scores in the mail. I have every confidence that they will come to Hersey next year as seniors and rival our departing class.

This newsletter serves as the official welcome to our incoming freshmen class. Freshmen Orientation is scheduled for August 18, from 7:30 AM to 11:30 AM. Letters have been sent to each new freshman student. This is a great way to learn about Hersey and I cannot encourage you enough to have your 9th grader participate in this event. They will learn about all the exciting opportunities in which they can participate during their four years at Hersey.

Also, please note that this year OPEN HOUSE will be held on Wednesday evening, September 14. This is a great opportunity to meet your student's teachers. We look forward to seeing you on that date.

For all parents, there will be a few changes next year. Every student will be given a District 214 email address. Also, MyGradeBook is being replaced by a new student information system, called Home Logic. The first time you use it, you will have to set up your account and login. We're excited about this new system; it should make communication between home and school much more efficient, and you will be able to easily monitor your student's progress in all classes.

Level Changes

If you and/or your child feel that a level change within a particular subject is necessary, please contact the Division Head for that subject to inquire about a level changes. Their names, email and phone numbers are listed on the JHHS website under Academics.

Schedule Change Policy During the School Year

Once the semester has begun, students may exchange an elective **the second week of school** (exact days to be determined) provided there are seats available in the course and it **meets during the same period** as the current elective. There will not be any changes to elective courses after the second week of school. Students will be responsible to obtain and complete all the work missed in the new elective course.

UPDATE ON PAYING FEES FOR STUDENT ENROLLMENT

- All students who are registering online must pay required fees with a credit card.
- In order to sign in for fee payment, password includes: student's ID, student's birthdate and telephone number.
- If you are paying by check or cash or for those who are applying for fee waiver or fee deferment, you must register AT Hersey on one of the following dates:

Fee Waiver: By appointment only on Tuesday & Thursdays
- If you do not have a computer at home, you may also come to Hersey on those days to use a school computer to register on one of the above times.
- **IF YOU DO NOT REGISTER BY JULY 31, A PROCESSING FEE OF \$25.00 WILL BE ADDED TO THE REQUIRED REGISTRATION FEES.**
- If you have Driver's Ed. on you schedule and are not taking it in January, you must call a counselor to remove it from your schedule before you can register online.

FRESHMAN PHYSICALS

- Don't forget freshmen must have a current physical (dated within the last year from August, 2010) to enroll in high school by state law. The physical and updated shot records must be mailed or dropped off to the Hersey Main Office before August 23 or your student may not attend school.
- If the physical appointment is after July 31, you should still register/pay fees **ONLINE BEFORE JULY 31** and mail or bring in your physical form immediately following the doctor's appointment.

College and Career Center News

From the desk of Nancy Davis

Class of 2012

Summer is a great time for rising seniors in the class of 2012 to build a list of potential colleges and get a jumpstart on the application process. Parents can support their sons and daughters in the following ways:

- 1) Take your student to visit a college open house or take a campus tour. There is no better way for a student to determine what they like and don't like in a college than to step on campus. ***What's Next? Planning for Life After High School***, the booklet mailed to your home earlier this spring, has a list of questions to ask colleges and a college comparison worksheet that will help guide the process. Be sure to register in advance for a visit by contacting the college admissions office.
- 2) Students can use Naviance, our web-based college planning tool, to identify colleges to visit and to research potential colleges. College websites also provide detailed information on each school.
- 3) Encourage your son or daughter to use the lazy days of summer to prepare for college applications. Taking these steps in the summer will reduce their stress in the fall:
 - Answer the senior survey, found in Naviance under the "About Me" tab. This survey provides their counselor with necessary information to write a college recommendation. We have asked all of our rising seniors to complete this survey over the summer.
 - Write an activities resume highlighting extracurricular activities, volunteer activities, part-time work, summer jobs, awards and test scores. An example is provided in the ***What's Next?*** Book.
 - Draft college application essays and personal statements. In July, many colleges post their college essay topics online. On August 1st, the 2011-12 Common Application will become available.
- 4) Have your son or daughter save their ACT and AP exam score reports mailed to your house this summer. Put these in a safe place, so you can use them when applying for scholarships next year.

Late in the summer, you will receive a senior parent newsletter with detailed information about the senior year college and financial aid application process. In the meantime, mark your calendars for these important upcoming College events:

SPOTLIGHT ON STUDENT SERVICES

SUMMER COUNSELOR HOURS

The Counseling Department will have different hours during the summer. Not all counselors will be available, but any counselor can assist with curricular concerns and some class schedule issues. The procedure and dates for elective course "Swap-O" (exchanging one elective for another) can be found in this newsletter and will only be addressed the dates given. It is for this reason that it is critical to make an appointment to see the counselor on duty for all other matters.

If you need an appointment to see the "counselor on duty," contact Ms. Carol Youngs, (847)718-4822.

NOTE: During the regular school year, it is always advisable to call to make an appointment to see a counselor or specialist. Oftentimes, it is assumed that counselors are always available. Unfortunately, reports have to be tallied, college applications completed, memos written to staff, and on and on and on. During the regular school year, appointments should be made directly with the individual counselor, psychologist, social worker, speech and language pathologist or nurse.

Interventions and Support for Success

Healthy Living Habits

This is the perfect time to think about adopting healthy living habits. Below are a list of habits that are important for our health year round, although they often slip our minds due to the busy life style we all lead.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 60% of Americans don't get enough exercise. Summer is the perfect time to develop and maintain a good exercise plan such as walking, running, swimming, and biking. There are many benefits to regular exercise such as reducing risk of high blood pressure, heart disease, and premature death. Exercise is also a great way to relieve stress and improve your mood since physical activity stimulates chemicals in the brain that leave you feeling happier and more relaxed.

Incorporating nutritious foods into your family's diets can also have many positive effects. Eating breakfast regularly helps improve teenagers' focus and academic performance at school. Breakfast eaters are more likely to report feeling physically and mentally better than non-breakfast eaters. Additionally, try to incorporate healthy and balanced meals throughout all meals in the day, and leave junk food or unhealthy snacks as treats rather than the norm. This will help your teen make educated and healthy decisions when choosing meals.

During the summer months it is especially important to remember to stay hydrated and drink plenty of water. Eight glasses of water or more are recommended if it is especially hot outside. It is also necessary to protect your skin from the sun. The AAD recommends that people wear an SPF 15 sunscreen and remain out of the sun during the peak hours of 10 a.m.-3 p.m.

Self-care is an important issue for teenagers as well. Encourage your teen to seek out professionals such as social workers or counselors if they are experiencing any problems. During summer break encourage your teen to take advantage of their free time and take up a hobby that interests them. Whether it be participating in sports, taking art classes, or doing volunteer work, finding a relaxing activity can be very enjoyable and rewarding. The more teens are busy, the less time they have for trouble!

Last, but not least, try to reduce unnecessary stressors in your life as well. Avoid making too many commitments and take time for yourself to relax and enjoy life. Remember the words of Abraham Lincoln, "Most people are just about as happy as they make up their minds to be."

RE: Asbestos Notice and School Pesticide Application Notification

These messages should be conveyed in writing to all staff, parents and students annually at the beginning of the school year by each school.

Regarding Asbestos:

During the year, we will be conducting asbestos operations and maintenance work at all district sites. Work includes inspection, repair, removal, and other response actions to small amounts of asbestos containing material. All work conducted by licensed asbestos workers and supervisors in accordance with IDPH, EPA and OSHA regulations. The work is generally conducted, whenever possible, in vacated areas and is monitored by a separate environmental consultant firm hired by the school district.

For information on the location of asbestos containing building materials in your building, please contact Brian Lichtenberger, Director of Operations @ 847 718-7619.

Regarding Pesticides:

In 1999 the Illinois General Assembly passed laws requiring that public schools notify parents/guardians and school employees at least 48 hours prior to any pesticide applications on school property. The term "pesticide" includes insecticides, herbicides, rodenticides, and fungicides. The notification requirement extends to both indoor and outdoor pesticide applications. Excluded from the notification requirement are antimicrobial agents (such as disinfectants, sanitizers, or deodorizers), insecticide baits, and rodenticide baits.

All Township District 214 High Schools have therefore established a registry of people who wish to be notified. To be included in this registry, please complete the form below and submit it to the Buildings and Grounds Supervisor at your school. Any other questions you may have regarding the District's pest management practices may also be directed to Brian Lichtenberger at 847 / 718-7619

John Hersey High School junior Thomas Martin of Mount Prospect travelled to Minneapolis, Minn., in late May to compete in the International Trumpet Guild Youth Competition.

Only 11 students throughout the world were invited to perform in the under 18 category. Martin performed with excellent enthusiasm, control, musicality, and nuance, finishing in 2nd place this prestigious event.

One commentator stated, "It was apparent to all in attendance that there are an impressive number of young students...who will make their mark on the trumpet world in years to come."

Hersey Student Recognized for Hockey

Ryan Papa has played for the Chicago Young Americans Hockey Team for the last 7 years. This year he played on the U18 Midget Major Team. The U18 team won State for the first time in 9 years. Ryan finished 3rd in his league for overall points this season out of over 500 players across the country. In addition to playing with the CYA U18 team, he was drafted to the Waterloo Black Hawks JR. Hockey Team where he was called up to play 8 games this past season, scoring 5 points in 8 games.

For the third year in a row Ryan has been selected to attend the USA Player Development Camp in Rochester NY in July. This is a camp of players representing all of USA Hockey's 12 Districts across the country.

Journalism

The Correspondent attended the Northern Illinois Scholastic Press Association's annual conference in April. There, *The Correspondent* was awarded the prestigious Golden Eagle trophy. Receiving this trophy means that *The Correspondent* was one of the top three papers in its class.

Individual members also earned awards at the conference. Sophomore **Kevin Hyde** placed sixth in broadcast news writing and junior **Shea Anderluh** placed fourth in editorial cartooning.

Senior **Taylor Kasper** took sixth place in state for feature writing.

While the state competition was being held, The Illinois All State Journalism team was announced, and senior **Teagan Ferraresi** was named to it. She was honored at the state luncheon on June 4 in Springfield as one of the top ten journalists in the state.

Principal Honored

Dr. Tina Cantrell was honored as the Illinois Journalism Education Association's Administrator of the Year. In addition to Dr. Cantrell's support of the school's journalism programs, Cantrell also served on the panel for Protocol for a Free and Responsible Student News Media last year and started her three year term on IHSA's journalism advisory committee this year.

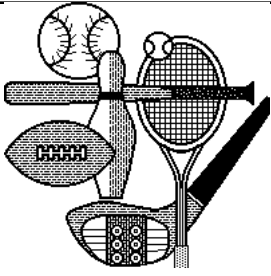

Beginning July 12, 2011 an asbestos abatement contractor licensed by the Illinois Department of Public Health will conduct an asbestos abatement project in rooms 103, 115, 155 A and B and 163 at John Hersey High School. The project involves the removal of asbestos containing floor tile. The project will last approximately two weeks.

Township High School District #214 has retained an independent third party environmental consulting firm, ENVIRON to provide oversight for the abatement project to ensure that the work is performed in accordance with applicable rules and regulations. A representation of ENVIRON will be on-site full time monitoring the asbestos contractor's removal operation.

During the removal process, procedures outlined by the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH), the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and the Environment Protection Agency (EPA) will be followed. Throughout the abatement projects each area to be abated will be cordoned off physically from the remainder of the building.
