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Student Services Team answers questions from our TDP Student Advisory Board

While high school can be a very exciting and meaningful time, it can also bring about many challenges for students and families. We know that each of us is most successful when we experience positive mental health and well-being, and we are fortunate here in District 214 to have many school-based mental health professionals on our staff to help enhance the student experience. In an effort to learn more about our mental health efforts district-wide, our TDP Student Leadership Committee posed questions to some members of our student services teams. Please read on to learn more about many of the supports we have in place!

QUESTIONS PANELISTS

What efforts is District 214 taking to destigmatize mental health challenges and mental health care in schools?

Brian Linhart, School Counselor at Buffalo Grove During my time at BGHS, there has been a noticeable emphasis on mental health within our school community. Several years ago, a group of students at Buffalo Grove initiated the Mental Health Committee, which was followed by the creation of the BG Mindful Movement two years ago, led by current junior Ann Cole. This initiative marked our school as the first in the state to affiliate with the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI). Events like our Go Lime Green event, which was open to all students district-wide, have demonstrated our staff and students' dedication to mental health. Continuous measures, including signage, announcements, engagement with external resources, and decompression stations reflect our ongoing commitment to instilling a sense of well-being among our students. Central to our mission is helping spread the message that mental health is just as important as physical health.

How can we help to re-energize students who are feeling burnt out and/or unmotivated?

Christina Dawson and Sara Rubin, School Psychologists at John Hersey High School.

One way to alleviate burnout and boost motivation among students includes promoting a healthy school-life balance by building self-care activities into their daily routines. We encourage students to regularly engage in a hobby or activity that brings them joy or relaxation. If students report they don't have time to participate in leisure activities because of their many obligations, we help them reevaluate their goals and manage their time more efficiently.

What supports are in place for students who are feeling stressed and over-scheduled with academics and extracurriculars?

Brett Kay and **Tim Franklin,** School Counselors at Prospect High School.

There is a lot of support in place for students who are feeling stressed and over-scheduled. Our school counselors can help students build a more balanced schedule, which might include an additional study hall or access to a more supported study hall within their school day. Our teams can also assist students with improving their time management skills and study skills through the utilization of our peer tutoring program, as well as scheduling individual appointments with their teachers. School counselors also help connect students with outside mental health professionals through our district's partnership with Care Solace.

How does Student Services make decisions about what supports to put in place for students?

Jonathan Senderak, District Coordinator and Dr. Jessica Herrmann, Director for Student Services When the Student Services team is not working directly with students, families, or teachers, they are working behind the scenes diligently to identify how to enhance mental health and wellness for our school community. Each week, the student services team and administrators utilize data, such as attendance, grades, survey results, and discipline reports, to learn more about what is impacting our students. This information, along with hearing directly from students, families, and teachers, assists us in determining which supports and services would be most beneficial to students, both within our buildings and across the district and community.

What wellness programs are being put into place, and how are they being made accessible for all students in our district?

Ray Galarza, Social Worker at the Academy at Forest View

All students in District 214 have access to a team of mental health professionals, including a counselor, a social worker, and/or a school psychologist. We facilitate a variety of counseling groups and partner with community agencies to provide programs and supports. Many of our schools run awareness campaigns throughout the year around the topics of mental health and wellness, prevention, drug abuse, depression and suicide, and other topics, and some schools have programming focused on prevention and intervention, such as Operation Snowball. Finally, we partner with local townships to assist with providing families with resources such as transportation, rent assistance, food assistance, and utilities.

What recommendations do you have for how students can prioritize self-care throughout the day?

Kurt Wagner, School Psychologist at Wheeling High School

Learn to notice your breathing. No other selfregulation tool is available as much as your own breathing. It will tell you about your current experience, and gives you a chance to influence your mood. Many of us are drawn to tools that help us escape from stress - we've all heard of "doomscrolling" - but we're left with the fact that although escape feels great, problems always wait. They'll be there when we can't avoid them any longer. Prioritizing self-care starts with recognizing what self-care actually is. "Caring" is a verb. It is active. "Self-care" is also active. Rather than passive relaxation happening to you because of favorite music or tik-toks, taking even one minute to actively and intentionally notice your breathing is a great way to start actively investing in your care.

How is District 214 addressing the impact of social media and digital technology on student well-being and mental health?

Jeanette Huerta, Social Worker at Elk Grove and **Rebecca Schilz,** Division Head for Student Success, Safety, and Wellness at Elk Grove

There is no doubt that social media and digital technology play a huge role in our daily lives. In District 214, we recognize that social media is a challenge for students and adults alike. Because of this, we strive to use digital technology in ways that positively enhance the student experience, whether that be facilitating the sharing of ideas, offering a different avenue for self-expression, raising awareness for things like mental health, and educating one another. When it comes to helping students manage the use of digital technology, District 214 has embraced a new cell phone policy that is designed to help students build self-discipline and fully engage in the classroom experience. We know social media can influence our mental and physical health, so we encourage students to find things they are interested in within the walls of our schools, like after school clubs and athletic teams, and outside of school, too.

How are schools helping students access outside mental health care?

Gabriela Medina, School Counselor at Rolling Meadows

When staff members believe outside mental health services might be of benefit to a student or family, they provide a general list of resources to the students and guardian(s). In addition, through programming like Signs of Suicide (SOS), students learn about other resources available to them if they are experiencing a crisis outside of school hours and need to speak to someone. For example, the 998 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline, Crisis Text Line, and Safe 2 Help Illinois help connect students with appropriate supports. Additionally, for any student or family member interested in seeking care outside of school, Care Solace is available to help. Care Solace is a complimentary and confidential care coordination service that can help you quickly find mental health or substance use treatment options matched to your needs, regardless of the circumstance. Enrichment and Career Pathways Courses

Each summer, the District 214 Talent Development Program offers a broad selection of enrichment classes. These courses are offered in person and are open to all District 214 students. Summer enrichment classes are designed to engage students in diverse and fun learning opportunities and to encourage students to explore new interests, to develop new passions and to explore different careers.

Summer enrichment classes are non-credit, so the learning environment is low-key and free of the pressure of homework and tests. Enrollment is, however, noted on student transcripts.

Most classes run for four days, or one Summer Experience week. Students may enroll in multiple classes for several unique experiences.
